SUMMARY

In this module, we will uncover your passion for serving others. LifeMission is composed of your Potential/Passion/Purpose. Your Potential is about how you serve with your natural talent and experience. Your Purpose is about why you serve (aligned with God's purpose). Your Passion clarifies to whom or what your service will be oriented.

Passion is the most powerful human force. Your passion will propel you to act and keep you returning for more. Your passion is a natural motivation source that compensation nor recognition can overcome. Your LifeMission requires a source of power from within your heart. We need to aim our LifeMission at activities that hit our hearts.

SUMMARY

A fundamental of **BATTLE READY** is that Jesus' expectation for engagement in His Kingdom requires work. Many have questioned the "works focus" for **BATTLE READY**. We are not discussing our works as a pathway to Kingdom entrance. One can only enter through faith in Jesus.

"For it is by grace you have been saved, through faith—and this is not from yourselves, it is the gift of God—not by works, so that no one can boast. For we are God's handiwork, created in Christ Jesus to do good works, which God prepared in advance for us to do." - Ephesians 2:8-10

With this concept in hand, we can treat the exploration of your LifeMission Kingdom work as we would In a work culture, beginning with your resume. God uses nearly every experience, both good and bad, to shape your LifeMission. For example, the Apostle Paul's experience included church experience, mentorship, low-cost probes (short-time experiences that explore possibilities), and a senior leadership position before his LifeLaunch into LifeMission. What are your roles and experiences to this point that have Kingdom relevance? It's time to build your resume!

THE FOUR CHAIRS

KEY TAKE-AWAYS:

SUMMARY

The Four Chairs have always been there. Perhaps this is the first time you've recognized the concept. A "table" exists for every business, non-profit, and church. You're likely sitting in the Work Chair. That's the chair at the table who commits the most time and effort to the enterprise. Next is the Wealth Chair. The person in this chair provides money for the funding of the operation. The "WOO" in WOO Chair stands for winning others over. This person who sits at this chair brings their network of friends to the table. The final chair is Wisdom. This person sitting in this chair has a rich history of making and overcoming mistakes. They provide guiding insight and likely come from the Work Chair.

Most people finish in the Work Chair and leave the table for retirement. Their influence has then ended. Depending on your experience and circumstances, you may have had the opportunity to sit in multiple seats at different Marketplace tables. If not, prepare to move to the Wealth Chair by gathering resources, the WOO Chair by accumulating relationships, and the Wisdom Chair by collecting experience. Many tables are available for your Kingdom LifeMission. You might even create your own. Think about which chair fits you best and position yourself to move.

KINGDOM LEADERSHIP - AUTHORITY OR INFLUENCE?

KEY TAKE-AWAYS:

SUMMARY

A key objective of **BATTLE READY** is a continuation of influence well into your senior years. Without that influence, your LifeMission will be much less effective.

Most leadership structures are based on authority. This construct can be traced to Moses in the Bible's Old Testament. Instead of Moses handling every leadership decision, his father-in-law suggested he spread followers between other leaders of lesser numbers of people to make more minor decisions. Authority-style leadership is limited. It also does not fit the servant leadership style Jesus desires of us (Matthew 20:22-28).

People follow authority leaders because they "have to." They follow influencers because they "want to." The influential leadership style is more powerful, loyal, and effective. It fits with Jesus' servant leadership mandate. Influence transcends every relationship, from your Spouse and kids to work and LifeMission. Your target is to be an influential leader. Focus on becoming exemplary in **BATTLE READY**, which will translate to influence in LifeMission.
